#### 3. Monochrome Digital Image Rules:

- A member CAN submit an image in the General Category, then convert that image to monochrome, and submit it into the Monochrome Category
- A member CANNOT submit the same monochrome image into both the General Category and Monochrome Category

#### 4. Definition of Categories:

- General Open category. Includes all genres such as nature, pictorial, monochrome, infrared, etc.
- Monochrome Image must be tints/shades of one color
- Creative/Artistic Photography producing an image using imaginative skill or originality of thought, including the altering of reality. Includes modifications made on the computer or in the camera

My photography experience began at the age of 16 when my mom gave me a Canon AE1 with a broken meter and I bought John Shaw's The Nature Photographer's Complete Guide to Professional Field Techniques. With this book, I learned the sunny f/16 rule and with many rolls of slide film in hand, I headed to the Wichita Mountains National Wildlife Refuge in southwest Oklahoma near where I lived at the time. This is how my love for photography was birthed and later with a new camera and lens, my grandparents took me on my inaugural trip to Big Bend National Park and the surrounding region.

I was delighted to be named an official Olympus Educator after making the switch from a full frame system which I had used for over 25 years to the Olympus OM-D system in April 2019. I have never been happier with my gear and its features and abilities.




# Website Improvements





# **DEANNE CUNNINGHAM**



# I THINK I MAY HAVE BEEN BORN CLUTCHING A CAMERA...

My father had a photography hobby, and took many shots of me as a toddler...a benefit my sister and brother never enjoyed.

I can't remember a time when I didn't take photos. I recall an early Kodak Brownie, and still have the photos from that time; mostly images taken from mountain tops and lakes.

I was born in Buffalo, and lived there until I was in 7th grade, when we moved to a lake-

front house in Angola. My

summers were spent playing tennis, swimming, and water skiing until I was college age, and I got a summer job as a "number please" operator with the phone company in Angola. Hard to believe in this technological age that it was in the days before we had dial phones.

My education continued at Syracuse University, where I earned a BA degree, a Masters in Education from Canisius College, and another Masters in English Folklore from Buffalo State. During this time, I also spent many summers in Ireland, including summer school at University College Dublin, and two summers at Trinity College Dublin.

What I consider the first of my three lives was teaching 11th and 12th grade English for 34 years at Eden Central school. The second life was combined with that time, when at nights and on weekends I was part of a folk group. We performed throughout the area, at coffee houses and concerts at Buffalo State and UB, as well as in Toronto.

# DEANNE CUNNINGHAM

Throughout this time, I still carried cameras around. At some point in the 70's, I went to Australia, with my Grandfather's Argus Rangefinder. I took beautiful shots of Koalas, Kangaroos, and the Great Barrier Reef. When I got home and had the film processed, the images were filled with orange streaks. The camera had developed a light leak.

Not long after that disappointment, I invested in a Konica system, and there began my fascination with birds. On my first visit to Sanibel Island in the early 80's, I raced up and down the beach in front of our cottage, chasing pelicans. With some luck, I captured some in flight and some roosting in the Australian pines along the shore. To this day, my favorite images are of birds in flight. Taking the time (and patience) to photograph them provides both the opportunity and excuse to observe their behavior in their natural settings. The enjoyment of photographing birds led to capturing images of other wildlife, and I was bitten by the travel bug, and Sanibel Island has become an almost annual destination.

At some point, photography became the reason for a trip, (I no longer referred to it as a vacation), rather than an adjunct to it. In the meantime, I never took a class or a workshop, but learned by trial and error, plus a good deal of mind-picking. A number of years before I retired from my first life, I had reached a point where I resented not having enough time to do what I wanted with my photography. I knew that what I really wanted to do was to write articles and provide my own photographs as illustrations. Surprisingly enough, it happened!

When I retired from teaching in '95, I spent five weeks in the late summer, doing a circle tour of the Southwest, and thus my third life began. Photographing wildlife and its environment became my main focus. I spent a

number of late November trips to Bosque del Apache in New Mexico photographing sandhill cranes and snow geese. In the early months of a given year, I enjoyed capturing the elephant seals at San Simeon on the California coast, and California pelicans with their beautiful red throats near San Diego.

For many years, (and more to come) I try to get to the Saint Augustine Alligator Farm in the second week in May. Nesting season in all aspects can easily be photographed then. Birds are mating, sitting on eggs, feeding nestlings, and posing in their glorious mating plumage. Moving up and down the boardwalk is the most walking needed, and you can photograph the birds from sunrise to sunset. It is easily one of my favorite places to photograph, with the added advantage that my sister lives only 45 minutes away.



My first two visits to Alaska were in 2003. I became addicted. I really needed a donkey to carry my equipment, as I carried three cameras, and photographed with print film, transparencies, and digital. I have totally lost track of the number of times I have visited Alaska. It competes with Africa as my favorite place for photography.

In 2013 I went to Kenya, and right now I think it is number one for me. I went to Tanzania last October (2019) and if possible would like to return to Kenya in the future.

Over the years, I have been fortunate enough to have received recognition from a variety of sources and organizations, such as NANPA (North American Nature photography Association), NFRCC (Award for Photographic Excellence), of which I held the offices of secretary and president, and even the Buffalo Zoo. I had prize-winning images published in *Wildbird* magazine three years in a row, and was the primary photographer for the organic gardening book *Great Garden Companions*, by Sally Jean Cun-


ningham, (Rodale Press, 1998).

For about eight years, I was the photographer for the "Buffalo in Bloom" gardening contest, and each year my collection of framed enlargements hung outside the mayor's office in the Buffalo City Hall.

Other articles appeared in *Birds and Blooms, Shutter-bug's Outdoor and Nature Photography, Artvoice*, and a variety of photography newsletters and internet magazines.

I have enjoyed presenting multi-media slide shows and other programs over the years, but overall, my best advice would be to shoot for yourself. Do what is enjoyable to you, rather than trying to shoot for the judges. I have also discovered that there is a domino effect to contributing your time and images. It can pay off in income-producing jobs.


















If you are like me you are thinking, "Here I am, stuck in Buffalo in February with NOTHING to take pictures of!!!" Not true. Watch for a fresh snowfall and get out there!! If you are prepared and a little brave you can capture some beautiful images. Thank you to Karl Miller, Tim Grabowski, Sally Zerfas, Maureen Szuniewicz, Mike D'Amico, Clare Ennis, Sarah Connaughton and Ted Lesinski for sharing their beautiful winter photos and tips as part of this article. Here are some tips for shooting in the winter weather:

**AVOID UNDEREXPOSING YOUR IMAGES:** Your camera will under-expose snow images and getting the exposure right can be a challenge. Typically, you will need to increase your exposure from what the in-camera meter is showing. I recommend shooting in manual mode. Use your camera meter on the snow and then increase the exposure by +1 stop. Check the back of your camera and make adjustments from there. If shooting in aperture or shutter priority use exposure compensation to increase your exposure. Try starting with +1.0, check results and make adjustments as needed.

Expose for the highlights. Look at your histogram to verify you are not clipping the highlights. Also, use the LCD display on your camera that shows blown out highlights (affectionately called "blinkies").

Shooting in RAW mode will allow you to make exposure adjustments in post-processing as needed.

**CAPTURING SNOWFALL:** Use a relatively fast shutter speed for falling snow. Usually a shutter speed between 1/250th to 1/500 of a second will do the trick. One source suggests using longer focal lengths which compacts a scene. This works great for falling snow, as it can give you a very layered look with differently-sized snowflakes. Again, look at the LCD on the back of your camera and adjust as needed.

**ACT FAST:** To capture a fresh snow fall you have to move fast, as it blows off trees quickly as the wind picks up.

**LIGHTING:** The sun is at a lower angle in the sky in the winter, and you can pretty much shoot throughout the whole day. The low angle of the sun creates interesting shadows and patterns.

**ADD A LITTLE BIT OF COLOR:** Winter scenes can be very monochromatic, so adding a little bit of color can make the image pop. For example, have someone wear a colorful jacket and pose in your scene. Or, as the image by Karl Miller that I've included in this article illustrates, a little touch of color makes all the difference.

**FILTERS:** A circular polarizer will help you eliminate glare off the snow and make the sky pop, if you are lucky enough to have a blue sky day...after all it is Buffalo.





Shooting in the cold and snow presents special challenges for your equipment and yourself.

**Battery:** Cold temperatures cause your batteries to lose power quicker. Bring extra batteries and keep them warm by storing in an inner pocket.

**Moisture and Condensation:** Moisture is the enemy. Most often, going from cold to warm will cause condensation on your camera and lens. To avoid this, before you move inside place your camera in an airtight plastic bag (ie: zip lock storage bag) and put the camera into your cold camera bag. Once inside, leave your camera bag closed with the camera inside and allow it to warm up slowly. Don't open the camera bag until after the bag and contents have completely warmed up. (You may want to remove your card from your camera before sealing your camera in the bag).

**Cold Hands:** Invest in special photo gloves with fingertips that fold down. See one type of these gloves below. Also, consider using chemical handwarmers.

**Keeping Gear Dry:** Do everything you can to keep your camera dry. Keep your lens cap on until ready to shoot and use a lens hood. If it is wet outside consider covering your camera and lens with a "rain cover" as pictured below.

**Staying Warm:** Being in Buffalo, we are all very aware of how to properly dress to stay dry and warm. Dress in layers. You can always unzip your jacket or remove a scarf or hat if you get too warm. I recommend the chemically activated hand and toe warmers.







Karl skillfully used post processing to transform these images into magical winter scenes. How many differences can you find? Here is how Karl said he did it: "Step one: Get rid of any annoying distractions using the healing brush and stamp tool. Then the main trick is in Topaz. I used chalk smudge and angelic radiance filters, cut back until they just "looked right," and on the bridge a few other layers as shown in layers images below. These shots were taken on my way home from work. I don't have a go-to spot for winter shots. I rely on the old stumble on something cool when I happen to have a camera with me approach."

#### **TIPS FROM DARLEEN:**

- 1) Because the winter voids much of the color from our scenes (at least here in NY), when you go out to shoot look more for shapes and contrast.
- 2) When hiking outdoors with your camera if you don't plan on taking images along the way much take your battery out and carry inside your coat pocket to keep warm. Always take spares as the cold drains them faster.
- 3) When bringing your camera in and out of warm environments, like from outside to hot car, make sure your lens cap is on. If you don't have one try a UV filter or even a plastic bag, as the condensation will form on the outer most layer of the lens. Also, put your camera into the camera bag while still cold and leave in there until it warms up gradually.
- 4) For hiking tips—wear wool socks. Take two plastic bags and an extra pair of dry socks with you. Then, if your feet get wet you can put the dry socks on. Then put your feet in plastic bags to keep warm while the shoes are still wet. It's a heck of a lot better than walking around with wet feet.

# **Topaz Sharpen Al**

Sharpen AI software, I did a little experiment to see if it really worked...and I am pleased to report I was amazed. And, as a nice added bonus, it is easy to use with minimal sliders and a simple preview window. I used it as a plug-in in Photoshop but you can also use it as a plug-in in Lightroom, as a stand-alone app and in Topaz Studio.

Topaz also makes several other products including DeNoise (reduces noise) and Gigapixel



#### Topaz Sharpen Al is

a sharpening and shake reduction photo retouching software, which can help make blurry or out-of-focus areas of your photos sharper.

According to the software maker, "Topaz Sharpen AI is the first sharpening and shake reduction software that can tell the difference between real detail and noise to create tacksharp images, even when you're shooting handheld, at night, or with a shallow depth of field."

The image below is from the Topaz website and shows how simple the interface is. Although I plan to watch a couple of videos about using it at a later date, I was able to open the software in Photoshop and use it without any confusion or difficulty.



# **Topaz Sharpen Al**

Although I did not run into a problem with processing time (I am fortunate to have a new, fast computer), I understand that in some cases the software can run slowly.

Sharpen AI and DeNoise AI are available from Topaz for \$79 each. For a 15% discount go to Anthony Morganti's website. Once on Any-

thony's website, look on the righthand side for the discount code and link to the Topaz website. topaz (anthonymorganti.com)

Following are my images that I processed with Topaz Sharpen Al. I kept the post processing to a minimum before applying Topaz Sharpen Al. See what you think.


Look at how Topaz Sharpen Al eliminated the camera shake. Not only is the eye much sharper, but check out the bird's legs. Wow!




